About

Elpida Home is an innovative Greek non-profit organization based in Thessaloniki, Greece committed to providing a humane, dignified, and empowered living experience for refugees and other vulnerable groups. We look to better the world by providing sustainable solutions in order to ensure successful integration to society.

Since our conception in 2016, we have achieved our goals by looking beyond basic needs, sustaining hopes as well as life, while remaining cost-efficient and sustainable. Such an approach is essential in the refugee response in Greece, as the shift from emergency response to long-term solutions continues.

Update

Building upon our efforts in 2021 and 2022, Elpida Home has remained dedicated to the Lily Pad Project throughout the past year. This initiative focuses on providing temporary resettlement to the 300+ evacuees we helped bring from Afghanistan to Greece in 2021. These vulnerable individuals were evacuated with the support of our founder, Amed Khan, who directly coordinated with the Greek government to ensure their safe entry into the country.

The Greek government established a secure pathway for evacuees from Afghanistan, particularly targeting former parliament members, judges, lawyers, and their families. These individuals were subsequently resettled to various countries, including Canada, through bilateral referrals facilitated by the US government. Leveraging Greece's status as an EU member state, Elpida Home served as a crucial local partner in streamlining relocation procedures.

Among the evacuees are 17 female Afghan MPs, 4 judges, along with numerous activists, medical professionals, and their families, all of whom faced imminent threats upon the Taliban's takeover of Kabul. Elpida Home assumes full responsibility for the well-being of these evacuees and provides essential legal assistance for their visa applications to Canada and/or the US.

The project's objective is to address all basic needs and provide comprehensive support services until evacuees are resettled in their final destination. This includes housing, food aid, healthcare, informal education, protection, and legal aid. Our primary aim is to ensure the dignified resettlement of the 300+ Afghan evacuees currently accommodated in Athens and Thessaloniki.



Each family receives top-quality services tailored to meet their basic needs throughout their stay in Greece and subsequent resettlement, empowering them to actively engage in the process of rebuilding their lives.





Case Management & Resettlement

In 2023, Elpida Home had successfully resettled 37 additional Afghan refugees to Canada, USA and Germany. In total, since 2021, we have resettled 297 people under this project, with our first resettlement flight taking place in February - only 5 months after their arrival to Greece.






Canada

Our legal team supported in coordinating and submitting 380 immigration visa applications to the government of Canada in total. Specifically to the department of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship which is responsible for matters dealing with immigration to Canada, refugees, and Canadian citizenship.

This number is made up of 196 applicants who were brought to Greece, with the remaining 184 being extended family members of our applicants who still remain in other countries. In this way, once our applicants in Greece are given visas & flight permissions for Canada, the rest of their families in other parts of the world join them in Canada as well.

Out of 196 beneficiaries with applications to Canada, 167 have resettled to Canada as of January 2023 thanks to the support of Elpida Home.






USA

Alongside applications for Canada, we also helped evacuate 99 people with various active applications to the United States. The visa applications vary among the community including SIV, i130, P1, P2 & Humanitarian Parole visas.

To date, we have helped resettle 41 (26 in 2023) beneficiaries to the United States. In contrast to the Canadian process, the US processing is notoriously difficult and lengthy, but we hope to have more departures of our US-destined beneficiaries in 2024.




Germany

Some of our beneficiaries initially destined to go to the United States, opted for family reunification within Europe while they await their US visas. Thus, we assisted 58 (3 in 2023) members of our population to reunite with their families in Germany.



Conclusion

In total, out of the group of people we brought, within the 2 years and 3 months of the project we have helped 297 people successfully resettle - an achievement Elpida Home's small team is very proud of. As of December 2023, our population stands 70 people in total. 66 are in Thessaloniki and another 4 in Athens.





Advocacy Mission to Washington D.C & New York



In May 2023, our Mental Health & Protection Manager, Jumana Abo Oxa went on an advocacy mission to Washington D.C & New York in order to advocate on behalf of our remaining beneficiaries in the hopes of expediting their pending cases. We were able to meet with U.S. government and legislative officials and international and non-governmental actors over the space of 2 weeks. Ms. Abo Oxa was also invited to speak about our efforts in DemocracyNow! Interview.



Additionally, with the assistance of the Quincy Institute for Responsible Statecraft, we organized a roundtable discussion with a variety of civil society stakeholders on the topic of Afghan resettlement.

Medical & PSS Department

Achievements

- 504 medical appointments booked in public hospitals in 2023 for both adults & children
- 2 medical appointments booked in private hospitals or clinics
- 301 people supported for embassy & visa related medical exams

We are happy to collaborate with Medecins du Monde Greece (MDM), through their polyclinic in Thessaloniki along with Medical Volunteers International (MVI), who have been kind enough to donate supplies for the health department. Additionally, as most of our Afghan community members are doctors and dentists themselves, both MDM & MVI have allowed them to volunteer their time with them as healthcare professionals.

For our PSS collaborations, we are happy to collaborate with Diotima, MDM, Blue Refugee Center, Irida Women's Center & Metadrasi.

Additionally in 2023, we were able to register all of our school-age children to kindergarten, elementary & high school in Sindos.








Volunteer Partners




Community Center

In addition to the Lily Pad Project, Elpida Home has maintained operations at its community center in downtown Thessaloniki, catering to the needs of the city's most vulnerable demographics. This center serves as a sustainable integration hub, facilitating the delivery of a wide range of services to Thessaloniki's marginalized communities. Our objective is to provide these communities with access to essential services and opportunities for self-empowerment.

Embracing an open-door policy, our team offers comprehensive support to the local community, allowing individuals and families to access a variety of services crucial for their daily lives and eventual integration into Greek society.

Our daily efforts at the center are concentrated in four key areas: legal assistance, health support and social integration support along with occasional clothes donations. Elpida Home collaborates closely with asylum-seekers residing in refugee camps in Northern Greece, individuals on the move, and the six detention centers we visit on a monthly basis.





Legal Department

Throughout 2023, Elpida Home's legal department, enhanced the impact of its services provided to vulnerable populations. We sustained and expanded our interventions across three levels, including the community center, interventions in detention centers, and ongoing participation in the Lily Pad Project. Simultaneously, our staff actively contributed to the planning and execution of actions beyond the conventional framework of humanitarian organizations. An example is our collaboration with the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki in implementing the interdepartmental postgraduate program on mass migration issues.

Our services were in demand amid significant changes in the legal landscape surrounding refugee migration, accompanied by new challenges in the field. In 2023, our efforts to expand outreach included visits to new sites and maintaining existing services.

Community Center

Throughout 2023, our legal open door project at the community center served a total of 105 beneficiaries, primarily from Palestine, Afghanistan, Syria, Algeria, Morocco, Pakistan, Iraq, Iran, Sri Lankan, and Sudan.

The cases we handled included legal counseling, representation to asylum (writing of appeals-communication for the stage of the case), legal representation in courts, in police and administrative authorities and communication with foreign embassies. Most of our beneficiaries required multiple services.

Detention Centers

We concentrated our efforts on Paranesti PROKEKA and police stations in the Thessaloniki area, with a total of 1,128 beneficiaries. In addition to PROKEKA, we visited police stations of Thessaloniki, such as Metagogon, Agios Athanasios, Kordelio and Thermi.

A significant number of detainees had previous convictions on penal law grounds, and the detention period for the majority ranged from 3 to 8 months, with some exceptions. Asylum seekers faced delays in interviews, largely due to the lack of official interpreters. Weather conditions including cold and heat, posed challenges. There is no free legal aid. Communication with the police authorities relied on detainees who spoke Greek, given that there are no official



interpreters. Our assistance consists of legal aid for asylum interview preparation, identification of potential minors, representation in administrative authorities, support for detainees claiming unlawful detention.

Lily Pad Project

In the Lily Pad Project, we continued to provide services to all the beneficiaries, assisting with facilitating access to Greek asylum service, maintaining contact with Greek authorities, and offering representation whenever needed.
